Our theme this half term has been 'Justice' which leads into Lent and Easter – "Goodness is stronger than evil." (John 18-19).


Miss Lindley's trip to India

As you will be aware, Miss Lindley recently spent ten days in India. It was great to hear that our children were following her blog whilst she was there. Every morning, Miss Lindley connected with each class for a Google Classroom meet. The children had the opportunity to ask many questions and also listen to Miss Lindley's accounts of her day and time in the Indian school. Their enthusiasm and maturity in their questions made me really proud.

This trip was so important to our school and highlighted our Christian and British Values.

Whilst Miss Lindley was in India, our children learned Indian poetry and stories, and looked at areas of India which they may not have known about. Learning about different cultures really helps to broaden the minds of our children.



Our links with Bhowanipore School will continue. Miss Lindley will be keeping in touch with the teachers there and has already received videos of the children singing songs that they learned with her.

SEND (Special Educational Needs & Disabilities)

Mrs Hodgson is our SEND-Co-ordinator. If your child has SEND, or you believe they have SEND, then she is happy to meet with you on a Thursday afternoon. An appointment will need to be made through Mrs Middlebrook.

All children with SEND needs have an IEP (individual education plan) and these are shared and discussed with parents in our parent consultation appointments. Your child's class teacher will have already approached you if we feel your child has additional needs. We have many things in place for our SEND children such as intervention sessions, differentiated work and positive play sessions. We also help children with their mental health and teach strategies to help children cope with the challenges that they face.

We value all our children whatever their needs.

What is going on in school?

The Mother Teresa Class

Years 1 and 2 have been doing some fabulous writing following the book Arlo by Catherine Raynor, I was privileged to be able to read some of their stories.

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Reception have been busy learning about traditional tales. They have completed science experiments on suitable roofs for the Three Little Pigs, they have baked gingerbread men and re-enacted the story, and they have also baked bread like the Little Red Hen.

The Amelia Earhart Class had a wonderful trip to Creswell Crags this half term where they learned more about their next topic Stone Age to Iron Age. On the trip they organised animal bones to identify different animals; they went into a cave for a circle time activity and they all had a go at throwing spears!

Our topic this half term has been World War II, both the children and I have loved this topic. Thank you to all the parents/carers who brought in WW2 artefacts and for making such a fantastic effort with their costumes on our WW2 day. It was a great success.

Some darned socks; had a go at knitting and some also got to mend their own clothing. Safeguarding at Rowsley CofE Primary

Illness & Attendance

If your child is poorly, you **must** telephone or email school between 8.30am and 9.15am every day that they are off, unless you have informed us that they have sickness and/or diarrhoea in which case they will need to be kept off for 48 hours. If we do not hear from you, Mrs Middlebrook will call to check on the whereabouts of your child. Please be kind to her when she does, as she is doing her job and it is a school requirement and standard practice in schools whether they are primary or secondary. If you do not call and we are unable to get in contact, Mrs Chisholm and/or Mrs Wyer may conduct a home visit.

The start of the term saw several children across the school being absent due to a variety of bugs. Please be assured that we promote handwashing after toilet visits and at lunch times, have tissues handy for troublesome colds, the school is cleaned thoroughly every morning and the tables are cleaned before and after lunch.

If your child has been sick or had diarrhoea, it is imperative that you follow the 48 hour rule as things like this can spread easily and it is unpleasant for children and staff to have to deal with this in school.

Interesting fact: the origin of the word diarrhoea is Greek and means 'to flow through.'

World Book Day

World Book Day is being held on Thursday 7th March. The whole school will be using the books 'The Lost Words' and 'The Lost Spells' by Robert Macfarlane to complete activities throughout the day.

At Rowsley we love books and encourage all our children to read for pleasure. Each child has been sent home with a World Book Day voucher. The voucher entitles every child to a free book from the WBD list or £1 off a book of their choice (if the book is over £2.99) from participating bookshops.

There is no theme and no obligation to dress up for WBD, but many children like the opportunity to come dressed as a book character. If your child does want to come dressed up, then they are more than welcome to. Likewise, if your child is not comfortable dressing up, then they can come in their school uniform and enjoy the costumes worn by others.

Reading Books

Every child is given a Reading Challenge Book. If your child has reached Lime Level they can progress through the reading challenges as their school reader – all the books have been graded to match the progression of each child as an individual. From Challenge 6 the children are expected to read their challenge book at least 4 times a week independently - this is to be recorded in the reading record.

If your child is still completing phonics lessons or has not yet reached Lime Level, then the reading challenges should be read by an adult or fluent reader <u>not</u> by the child. These books are marked with a red dot sticker. We do not expect the children to read the red dot stickered books as they are just at the start of their reading journey and some of the words are to complex and do not follow the phonics pattern being taught in school. If you have any questions on this or are at all unsure, please do come and see me or your child's class teacher.
