Christian Values

This half-term our children have been learning about 'Justice' and this was reflected through the readings of our Collective Worship Group at our Easter Service. The children have showed a great understanding of what justice means. One child said, "When you feel life is unjust, God will make it just." Next term's Christian value is Service.

We had our SIAMs Inspection this week, this is where the school is inspected for its Christian Values and Christian ethos – the inspection explored the ways in which our school's Christian vision drives our work and enables us to live up to our status as a Church school. The final report will be ready by the end of April and we will publish the results as soon as we can. We can report that we are incredibly proud of our children who demonstrated our values of "Love, Belonging, Compassion, Faith and Belief." Thank you to all of them for showing what a wonderful school we are. Thank you also to the parents and governors who spoke to the inspector and finally a big thank you to all the staff who put in so much effort to showcase our school.

What is going on in school?

The Mother Teresa Class

This half term, KS1 have been learning about the Golden Age of Piracy & the Elizabethan Era. As part of their topic, we took a trip to Haddon Hall! We got on the bus and were given a guided tour of the house and the Chapel. The children were absolutely wonderful and their behaviour was exceptional. After lunch, we had a dressing up session where the children could dress up in the costumes that were relevant to the Tudor times. We had such a wonderful day.





The Amelia Earhart Class

It has been a great topic on the Stone Age and Iron Age, which was kicked off with our trip last half term to Creswell Crags. The children have loved learning about Stone Age animals. In Science we have been investigating how water travels through plants and we have started our vegetable plot by planting bean seeds and potatoes. In RE we have written a class poem:



We also created some great Kennings about nature and decorated them with some beautiful stencils.



The Marcus Rashford Class

It may have only been a short term but we have continued to work hard in all our subjects. Our topic has been Earth and Space and we have orbited around the sun (a yellow beach ball) as the planets - in the form of various fruits. The fruits were different sizes to reflect the comparison between the planets i.e. the largest planet (Jupiter) was represented by a melon and the smallest planet (Mercury) was represented by a peppercorn.

We have learned the ten commandments through actions and written our own lessons for life. Here are a few examples: "Don't put yourself down because of someone else's words." (Y5), "People are like flowers, don't pick the prettiest just because they're pretty because they might not be the nicest." (Y6), "Don't change yourself for other people." (Y6), "Go and live your life, you never know what will come next." (Y6). Wise words from ones so young. I am most proud of their art work on Frida Kahlo and self-portraits. The children continue to amaze me with their talent.









Forest School

Forest school plays a major part in the spirituality of our children. Through going to the woods every week, they learn the pleasures of nature and understand that they can learn from it and that through this they can change their lives and appreciate that they are part of a bigger picture. Through being outdoors, our children learn many skills and emotions and learn their place in the world. Every session starts with a prayer, asking God to watch over them and thanking God for the world around them. They end every session with some reflection time. We ask that children

come to school on Forest school days with black/blue joggers, their school jumper and waterproofs with walking boots or wellies. School can provide some waterproofs.

Toddler Forest School will return after Easter. It will be held on every Thursday morning from 9am, children from the age of 2 are welcome to come along with their parents. The cost is £2.50 per child.

Safeguarding at Rowsley CofE Primary

We are working with a charity called Compass, who will be holding various online parent workshops throughout the year - all designed to help parents navigate life in this ever-changing world.

On Monday 15th April, they are hosting an online parent workshop, focusing on healthy sleep routines for primary aged children. The workshop will take place online via Teams and will last for an hour (9:30am10:30am).

Areas covered include:

- the importance of sleep and its function;
- what happens when children do not get enough sleep;
- how to support children to develop a good sleep pattern;
- as well as self-care and support for ALL.
